Retirement of Dr. Tanya Lyons

With a heavy heart the AFSAAP executive team announces that Tanya Lyons is retiring from her responsibilities as the Managing Editor of the Australasian Review of African Studies, and also acting- Treasurer of AFSAAP.

Tanya has been invaluable to AFSAAP. She has been part of the AFSAAP team for an impressive 25 years. In 1994, she attended her first AFSAAP conference, as a postgraduate from the University of Adelaide. Between 1995-1999, she was the Postgraduate Coordinator of AFSAAP. After completing her PhD in 2000 (*Guns and Guerrilla Girls: Women in the Zimbabwean Liberation Struggle - African World Press, Lawrenceville, NJ, 2004*), since 2000 she has undertaken various executive roles such as Secretary, Treasurer, Webmaster and administrator for AFSAAP online.(when websites became necessary, and then when social media took over). From 2008 onwards, Tanya became the Managing Editor of the Australasian Review of African Studies (AFSAAP's Journal), a role in which she has been annually re-elected to, by the AFSAAP membership. With various co-editors, she has been able to get ARAS recognized by the main indexes and all the while remain an independent journal, published by AFSAAP. Between 2012-2017 Tanya was the President of AFSAAP. Tanya also convened and hosted three AFSAAP conferences in 2003, 2011 and in 2017.

We are incredibly grateful to Tanya for very many reasons. Thanks to Tanya, AFSAAP is where it is today. Because of her, many excellent articles have been published in ARAS, and students, academics and others have gathered at AFSAAP conferences – sharing knowledge as well as celebrating African Studies in the region. Especially for postgraduate students her everlasting promotion of and interest in their research projects, and her always encouraging words have been extremely valuable. In particular she has facilitated the annual AFSAAP Postgraduate Prizes, and other travel grants helping students to promote the research. Tanya was truly the glue that held the AFSAAP family together, our very own 'mama AFSAAP'.



Tanya's retirement from AFSAAP means that it is now time for a younger generation of Africanists to step up and lead AFSAAP into a bright future. Let's not let her down!

RECENT EVENTS

41st AFSAAP Annual Conference a resounding success!

The 41st AFSAAP Annual Conference held under the theme ‘Africa in Transition: Governance, Society and Culture’ was successfully held between November 21st – 23rd 2018 at the University of New South Wales, Sydney. Convened by Africanist scholar Dr. Anne Bartlett (University of New South Wales), the conference which consisted of fascinating panels, roundtables, thematic conversations and individual papers drew participants from many countries.

Australia National University (ANU)

In February, the ANU African Studies group held its first monthly discussion of the year.
