AFSAAP ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2018

Africa in Transition: Governance, Society and Culture Call for Papers

The African Studies Association of Australasia and the Pacific (AFSAAP) calls for proposals for pre-organized panels, roundtables, thematic conversations and individual papers for its 41st annual meeting to be held at UNSW, Sydney from November 21st to November 23rd 2018.

Recent years have witnessed significant transitions in the governance of African nations. Longstanding leaders, many of whom were major figureheads in the post-colonial era, have given way to demands for change. Sometimes the transitions have been relatively peaceful such as South Africa and Zimbabwe, yet others such as Libya and Egypt have been tumultuous, leaving the nations concerned reeling from the after effects of change. In other nations, the grip of power has been tightened with attempts to do away with term limits or to interfere in the political process surrounding elections. Still others, such as South Sudan, have plunged into civil and ethnic violence which threatens the future stability of this new nation. Climate change, environmental loss and migration are influencing African societies, complicating patterns of governance.

Such changes reverberate across society with calls to rethink the nature of civil society and political participation, as well as the nature of equity and belonging. The call to rethink the way that society functions exists not only in the political sphere, but also across the whole spectrum of the arts and cultural communities as they come together from diverse backgrounds to envisage a different kind of shared future. While the deep challenges that remain must be acknowledged, it is also the case that such change can provide fertile ground for creative thinking and the exchange of ideas between academics, political actors and civil society organizations.

We therefore invite papers that engage with, but are not limited to, the theme: Africa in Transition: Governance, Society and Culture. As always, we bring together scholars working in different disciplines. We invite participants to contribute theoretically innovative and empirically grounded papers, panels and presentations that enhance our understanding of these issues.



Though the central focus will be on this broader theme, we also welcome contributions on other topics that consider Africa, or Africa/Australia/Pacific relations and Africans in the region. *Habari kwa ufupi* - AFSAAP Newsletter NO. 88 - April 2018.

All proposals will be peer reviewed. Abstracts of proposed papers, panels and roundtables should be sent by July 1st, 2018 to Dr. Anne Bartlett, International Studies, Morven Brown 230, UNSW, Sydney, NSW, 2052, Australia. 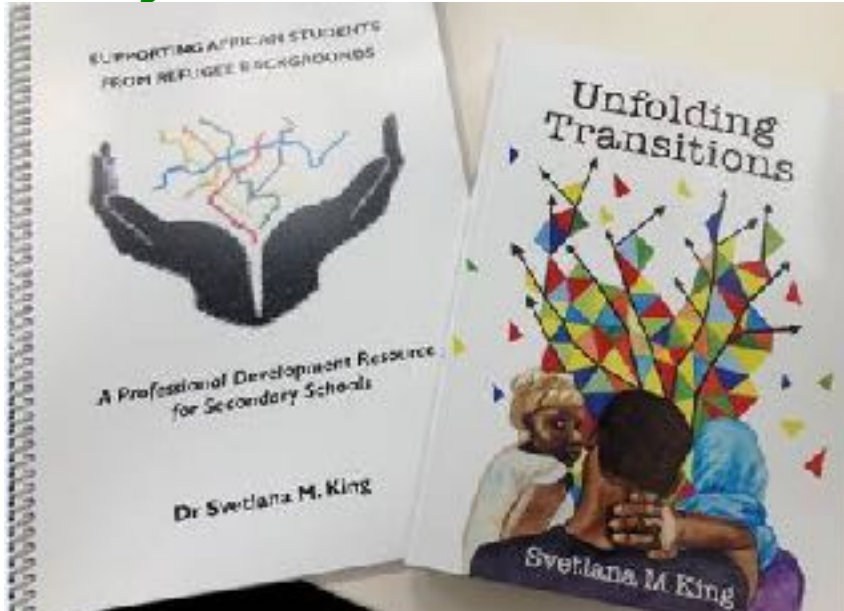

Unfolding Transitions: The Education & Career Pathways of African Youth from Refugee Backgrounds in South Australia



Participation in education and employment are key indicators of social inclusion and integration for refugees. For young people, this typically involves a transition from secondary school to work and further study. This book details a four-year research study which examined the lives of 14 African youth as they made this transition, and those who support these young people. This is the journey of their unfolding lives.

This book is suitable for use by educators and schools, refugee youth workers, educational researchers, and those involved in teacher education.

Supporting African Students from Refugee Backgrounds: A Professional Development Resource for Secondary Schools

This resource provides schools and teachers with a self-guided professional development framework for engaging in collaborative conversations to identify strategies to support African students from refugee backgrounds. It is intended to facilitate discussion in schools about how the needs of African students can best be met. Included in this resource is a Cultural Understanding Quiz, a Case Study, and a Directory of Resources.

This professional development resource is designed specifically for educators and schools. It is also likely to be beneficial for refugee youth workers, pre-service teachers and those who work in teacher education.

Roundtable Discussion: Law, Love & Possibilities for Decolonisation

Professor Onwubiko (Biko) Agozino, Virginia Tech, USA

Wednesday, 13 June 2018 2:00- 5:30 pm Level 11,

Boardrooms 1 & 2, Flinders University @182 Victoria Square, Adelaide

This roundtable discussion with Professor Biko Agozino will focus on possibilities for justice and decolonisation across a number of sites but with specific emphasis on the disciplinary domains of law and criminology. While these realms of knowledge are often imagined as distinct, it is



perhaps their relation to colonial power that binds them inextricably. Invited speakers from law, criminology, security, history, migration and gender studies will be brought into dialogue with the aim of drawing out the multiple connections between law, crime and colonisation; in terms of the everyday lived effects of laws and criminalisation and in relation to the ways that the disciplinary domains of law and criminology produce truths to efface their role in entrenching and extending colonial power. There will be a focus on the nature and role played by law/laws and crime/criminality in different realms and disciplines in order to explore new ways of reorienting knowledge and knowledge production to aid decolonisation.
