The Francophone Africans: A Last Frontier for Australia

A presentation by Mr William Fisher: Special Envoy of the Australian Government for the Francophone States of Africa and La Francophonie

Tuesday 17 October, 6:00pm- AIIA Conference Centre- Stephen House, 32 Thesiger Court, Deakin ACT.- While Africa in general, and the French-speaking part of it in particular, may seem of distant interest to Australian preoccupations, there is an increasing number of issues where Australia will find it needs constructive



partners in this region. The 24 Francophones constitute about half of the African bloc, and thus are an essential group in any contested UN vote, where they can act quite efficiently as a bloc. Each country is quite different, and state governance issues are often complicated. Terrorist threats can dominate in several, particularly the Sahel countries, while much of central and equatorial Africa suffers from years of often violent political instability and poor development outcomes. The Indian Ocean states, while not immune from political troubles of their own in the past, are generally now doing rather well. Australia has no assets in the region, and no resident Embassies other than, from just this month, Morocco.

This essay apparently did not meet any of the required academic standards, was making outrageous claims, yet was still published in Third World Quarterly, but without any consultation with the Editorial Board, and with no respect to the 3 peer reviewers that rejected it.

As noted by ARAS Editor Dr. Tanya Lyons in an email notification to all AFSAAP Members about this issue, she reminded us that as African Studies Scholars, and as subscribers to one of the few independent journals on African Studies (The Australasian Review of African Studies) we have a responsibility to uphold the intellectual rigour to ensure knowledge is shared, and research is used in a positive way. This recently published article in the TWQ, a so-called top ranked journal in development studies, just demonstrates how ridiculous the 'citation' pressures have become, and how they have obviously giving voice to outrageous and shameful opinions.

As the Editor of the Australasian Review of African Studies Dr. Lyons took this opportunity to remind you all to submit your articles to ARAS, as we are proud of our tradition of publishing properly peer reviewed articles that enables AFSAAP members to share your fabulous research and encourage scholars to strive for excellence. ARAS does this on a shoestring budget and has not needed to bend over backwards for corporate publishers, or the pressures to meet all of these ridiculous metrics as measured by other corporate companies, which are buoyed on by the university administrators and the over-zealous bean counters. We certainly do not approve of giving valuable publication space to such shameful views as the TWQ has done.
