Africans in the Australian Census

This note is in two parts. The first consists of Table 1 and shows the number of persons born in Africa enumerated in the 2001 and 2006 Australian censuses. The second part spells out the steps for extracting the 2006 data on the Africa-born from the Australian Bureau of Statistics webpage. The data can be obtained at the sub-national level. For example, you can find out the number of persons born in Sudan for the Stirling (Western Australia) Local Government Area, Statistical Local Area or Electoral Division.

Do It Yourself Statistics

This section describes how you can find out more about Africans in Australia in 2006 from the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) webpages:

- 1. The ABS URL is <u>http://www.abs.gov.au/</u>
- 2. Open this and click on Census Data on the menu to your left.
- 3. OR go straight to

http://www.abs.gov.au/websitedbs/d3310114.nsf/home/Census+data

- 4. See the heading Find Census Data by Topic and click on 2006 Census. The next page is headed Census Data by topic and you need to respond to the two questions (in blue type). Select usual place of residence. Select the topic, by scrolling down. In this example Birthplace is the chosen topic, so click on Birthplace and then on Country of Birth by Person (full classification list).
- 5. Decide which area you want. This example uses the whole of Australia, so type in Australia in the box, and click on Search. Respond to the question "Which location do I select ?' by clicking on Australia. (NOTE at this stage can you can search for Statistical Divisions, Local Government Area, etc.).
- 6. Click on Select Product. Click on View Census Table. You should now be on a page headed 2006 Census Tables.
- 7. Click on <u>Details Tab</u> which is towards the bottom of he screen
- 8. Click on Free Download and wait while it loads
- 9. Click on Open. You should then have the COUNTRY OF BIRTH OF PERSON table in EXCEL format
- 10. Choose your country, e.g. Angola is on line 22 and shows there are 196 males and 199 females born in Angola, giving a total of 394, as shown in Table 1 above.
